How to easily put PDF (portable document format) books on to your Kindle

At any given time I have about 60 books on my Kindle; some to be kept indefinitely and new ones waiting to be read before being deleted. On my computer I have at about 80 books in PDF format (which are mainly reference documents). I download most of my books for the Kindle reader directly in MOBI format but sometimes I want to transfer a PDF book to the Kindle for reading, say, whilst on holiday. This is how to put a PDF book on to your Kindle.

You need to have Calibre (latest version at 3/7/16 is 2.61) and k2pdfoptv2.34b [downloaded from willus.com] on your computer. What k2pdfopt does is optimise the PDF file for a small screen so that it can be converted to MOBI by Calibre and then put on to the Kindle.

I have permanent shortcuts on the desktop to these two utilities because I use them so often. I keep a list of MOBI books for my Kindle in a folder called "for Kindle" and another list of PDF books for converting called "for K2pdf". Then I convert and transfer in batches from time to time.

These are the steps:

- 1 Open k2pdf and transfer your PDF book(s) into the box and specify the output
- 2 Close k2pdf, plug Kindle into your computer and open your "for Kindle folder"
- 3 Grab each title and drop into Calibre.
- 4 Convert each title in turn to MOBI format and send to Kindle. folder (eg. "for Kindle). Click convert all files.
